

- Historical Linguistics is about the history of languages and how they have changed over time.


3. Who was the first person to recognise Sign Language was a true language?



William Stokoe

1919-2000

•was a <u>scholar</u> who researched <u>American Sign</u>
<u>Language</u> (ASL) extensively while he worked at <u>Gallaudet</u>
<u>University</u>. He coined the term <u>cherology</u>, the equivalent of <u>phonology</u> for sign language.

- Mary Brennan 1944-2005
- Born and raised in Gateshead and attended the University of Newcastle upon Tyne. She taught first at Cologne University before moving to Moray House College of Education in Edinburgh. Her responsibilities at Moray House included teaching on a course for teachers of deaf children.

7. Why did the UK start BSL linguistics later than USA?





- Because the cost of the video cameras and the video recorders we could able to afford and access for research with evidences.
